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DIDACHE: PROUD MOMENT FOR THE ST. THOMAS SYRO-MALABAR CATHOLIC DIOCESE OF CHICAGO

It was a proud moment for the diocese as the first batch of 46 laity from the Mar Thoma Theological Institute from the Mar Thoma Sleeha Cathedral successfully completed the course.

Didache theological program was established by the Paurastya Vidyapeetham, Vadavadoor, Kottayam for the laity. The Didache program within the St. Thomas Syro-Malabar Catholic Diocese of Chicago was coordinated through the Department of Faith Formation, under the auspices of Rev. Dr. George Danavelil. Approximately 400 students are currently

enrolled from through-out the diocese and is at different stages of completing the courses.

The journey for the Mar Thoma Theological institute at the Mar Thoma Sleeha Cathedral started three years ago with approximately ninety students and forty-six graduated the course. In order to complete the course, each student must complete twenty-four subjects and for each subject, the student is expected to write assignments, classroom presentations, and a written exam on each topic. Faculty include subject matter experts from within the United States and from Kerala.





The program was successful due to the wholehearted support and encouragement from both Bishop Mar Jacob Angadiath and Auxiliary Bishop Mar Joy Alappatt. Within the parish, Vicar, Rev. Fr. Thomas Kadukappillil, assumed the role of administrator for the program, and Mr. Thomas Moolayil and Mr. George Ambatt as program coordinators ensured courses are completed, encouraged completing assignments, and provided one-on-one assistance to students.

The convocation ceremony was conducted at the Mar Thoma Sleeha Cathedral Parish Hall, Saturday, February 5, 2022. Bishop Mar Jacob Angadiath and Mar Joy Alappatt along with Rev. Thomas Kadukappillil, Vicar General and Vicar of the Mar Thoma Sleeha Cathedral; Rev. Dr. George Danavelil, Chancellor of the Diocese and Director of the Department of the Faith Formation; and Rev. Dr. Andrews Mekkattukunnel,

President, Paurastya Vidyapeetham (attended via zoom), students, family and others attended the ceremony.

Rev. Dr. George Danavelil submitted the class for approval and Rev. Dr. Andrews Meakkattukunnel, accepted it. Mar Jacob Angadiath distributed the diploma certificates to the students. Everyone congratulated the graduates for their accomplishments. Bishop Mar Jacob Angadiath in his presidential address, stated that the graduates will help invigorate the faith formation of our diocese. Mar Joy Alappatt stated that these warriors will help defend our faith and help the church to transmit the sacred traditions of our faith. Ms. Cicily Varkey and Mr. Joppan Joseph, representing the class, shared their experience with the gathering. George Ambatt delivered the vote of thanks. The ensuing dinner and cake cutting marked the end of the graduation ceremony.



SAFE ENVIRONMENT FOR OUR CHILDREN AND YOUTH OFFICE FOR THE PROTECTION OF CHILDREN AND YOUTH

As the Chairman of the Protection of Children and Youth of the diocese, I had to address inquiries about situations where our community members have raised questions about the proper behaviors/actions by teachers, parents, and priests in various circumstances. Most of these situations are the result of actions by individuals who intended to correct the children but, causing pain and discomfort to the child or the parents because of misguided enthusiasm.

In dealing with children, adults should keep in mind that all children are individual personalities, which need to be always respected and all actions should be geared towards enhancement of expression of this individuality. Any challenge to individuality should be avoided at all costs.

Any disciplinary action should be corrective and done in a private session intended and planned for that purpose. Public chastising, while may seem an appropriate teaching moment for the class/group, it has very sustained negative effects on the children. A few points worth mentioning:

- Scolding children in Public should be avoided. While the instant punitive response may have the best behavioral change in animal experiments, the negative impact will also have a sustained impact on one's life.
- Corporal Punishment of any kind including slapping, pinching, should be avoided.
- Isolating the child for disciplinary purposes, like making one stand in the corner, waiting outside the class, sending a child home should be avoided.
- Grabbing food, books, and toys and throwing them away are inappropriate instant responses to child behavior where the adult responds like a child in response.

Publishing grades: There had been several complaints about publishing grades and recognizing students based on academic achievements. Generally, the grades and student achievements are subjects shared among the student, teacher and parents. There are governmental regulations that guide the release of grades for schools. As the age of the child increases the parent-access to the academic progress decreases. Any other release is for statistical analysis where individualized scores are not released. However, schools also would like to use academic recognition as a means of motivating students. Rank order is still used by many schools to identify the top students, but never published. Ranking enhances competition and is not considered efficient except for physical activity.

Some schools rank students on several aspects of academic achievements and publish the top 5 or 10 of each ranking list. The most effective way of using academic achievements as motivational aids is to provide an evaluation of projects given to small groups and the groups ranked, based on several academic factors.

"Creative educational uses of technology hold promise for increasing motivation for a generation of students who have grown up teaching themselves to communicate online, surf the Web, write blogs, or edit photos." ("UsherKober) Inquiry-based learning provides opportunities for students to acquire knowledge and develop analytical skills by choosing activities that interest them. This also will eliminate the need for publishing individual grading.

"All scripture is inspired by God and is useful for teaching, for refutation, for correction, and for training in righteousness, so that one who belongs to God may be competent, equipped for every good work." [2 Timothy 3:16-17]

The Theology is a way for tasting the grace of God. We all experience how tasting something like cake becomes more meaningful when we know details about the ingredients. When we know that God is our creator and the ultimate destination we would like to reach, we should use every opportunity to learn more about God so that we can taste the absolute goodness of Him. For centuries, Theology has been a concept that is mostly associated with the priests and the religious. As lay people, it never occurred to most of us that we would learn theology, prior to our diocese starting the 'Didache' program.

The preparation of our parishioners to participate in the Didache Theology course began towards the end of 2019 under the guidance of our Vicar at the time, Rev. Fr. George Ettuparayil. The kick-off of the course took place in August 2020 with 24 students, when Fr. Dr. George Danavelil, Director of the Department of Faith Formation of our Diocese was our interim-Vicar. We are profoundly grateful to Fr. Dr. George Danavelil, the Diocesan Director of the Didache program, for spending countless hours to arrange the professors from the Pontifical Oriental Institute for our virtual classes every month and to guide us in every step of this journey. We thank our vicar Fr. Ligory Kattiakaran and Assistant vicar Fr. Rajeev Valiyaveetil for their continued

support and blessings to complete this theology course.

The Didache theology course helps us to enjoy the sweet taste of God in a very meaningful way. Below are some snippets of the feedback we received from the participants about the Didache course experience:

"I know now that I know nothing."







FOSTERING TEAM SPIRIT THROUGH MULTI-GRADE LEVEL GROUP COMPETITIONS AT SACRED HEART KNANAYA CATHOLIC FORANE CHURCH IN TAMPA, FLORIDA

One of the problems with secular education is that children are often kept with their peers and have minimal opportunity to interact with other children in different age groups. Children growing up without exposure to individuals from different age groups often have a difficult time socializing in the real world as adults in the workplace or other areas of social engagement.

To tackle this issue, the faith formation program of Sacred Heart Knanaya Catholic Forane Church of Tampa had created an innovative system a few years back designed by the former DRE, Sonia Pazhuka. In this approach, multiple grades are assigned a color, either green, red or blue. Each team color will consist of grades from various age levels, having two grades from elementary, one grade from middle school, and one grade from high school. The three teams will work together whenever the CCD program has competitions. Competitions include Christmas carol competitions, groupbased oral bible quizzes, competitions during CCD Picnics, and CCD festival performance competitions. The three teams also earn points if one of their team members submits an article or artwork to our church bulletin.

The teams' scores are tracked on Church's faith formation website, http://www.sacredheartccd.org. On December 19th, 2021, the teams came together for a Christmas Carol competition. The competition's winner was the blue team, and they earned 10 points. At the end of the year, the team



that makes the most points at the end of the year will receive a rolling trophy. This multi-grade level group competition approach has fostered unity among our CCD students, encouraged sportsmanship, and fostered Christian fellowship greatly needed among our youth.

LENT WITH THE SAINTS



Spending Lent with the saints is a great way to grow in holiness. We can gain inspiration from learning about their lives. Our liturgical calendar is filled with saints who lived colorful lives of extraordinary grace. They can help us go higher in this time of preparation for Easter.

In the season of Lent, we are called to examine our lives, turn away from sin, and renew our commitment to living as Christ taught us. Traditionally, we are invited to engage in three practices: almsgiving, prayer, and fasting. By embracing these practices, we can refresh our spiritual lives. Many of the saints made such practices the center of their lives. Though we might not match the extremes to which the saints took these disciplines, we can still learn from their spirit. Let's look at some saints whose lives were exemplars of almsgiving, prayer, and fasting.

Almsgiving: It is the practice of giving to those in need. The Christian tradition tells us that we have a duty to provide for the poor, the widow, the orphan, and the alien. Some saints have gone so far as to not only give of their excess, but to give all to the poor. St. Katharine Drexel, whom we celebrate on March 3, was an American heiress born just before the Civil War. She gave up her wealth (equivalent to \$200 million today!) and entered a convent.

St. Therese of Calcutta stated that "Poverty is freedom. It is freedom so that what I possess doesn't own me," The ability to give freely stems from a recognition that all we have is a gift from God. This recognition allows us to be generous. Our giving does not have to be in large ways. A small gift to the local food pantry, participating in the parish collections, or taking a meal to a new parent or an elderly person is good to move forward on our Lenten journey.

Prayer: We are called to dive into the sea of prayer, which is the sea of God's boundless love. **It is the "raising of one's heart and mind to God,"** as St. John Damascene defined it. In Lent, we turn back to prayer and away from the distractions of the world. St. Dominic Savio, whose feast day is March 10, only lived to be 14 years old, but his life was marked by prayerfulness. He would spend hours in silent meditation.

St. Therese of Calcutta explains "If you want to pray better, pray more,". There are no perfect words or gestures, just pray

from your heart. The first way we can pray more is to disrupt our routine by making room for silence by turning off the television during dinner, switching off the radio in the car, and putting down our smart phone.

The personal prayer life of St. Alphonsa was an outflow of her intimacy with the Lord and was fulfilled in her conscious choice of making the Lord the center and priority of her life. The ultimate sign of that infinite Love is nothing but Cross.

Fasting: Pope Francis exhorts us, "Fasting makes sense if it leads to some benefit for others, if it helps us to cultivate the style of the Good Samaritan, who bends down to his brother in need and takes care of him. St. Joseph Oriol, who is celebrated on March 23, was a 17th-century Spanish priest. He is known for his intense regimen of fasting. During Lent each year, he ate only once a week!

Saint Francis spent 40 days on an island in the middle of Lake Perugia taking nothing with him but two small loaves of bread. Fasting helps us to attune our hearts to the essential and to sharing. It is a sign of awareness and responsibility in the face of injustice, abuse, especially to the poor and the little ones, and it is a sign of the trust we place in God and in his providence.

Saint Teresa of Avila explains "Lent is a time for fasting but not a gloomy fasting that lowers one's spirit. It is meant to be a way of lifting one's soul and growing in love and communion with God and neighbor. For many, our simple meal might be more like a royal banquet". Like St. Teresa, we must see it as an attitude of love not a harsh rule to be endured!

Let us turn to our heavenly friends this Lent. We can commit to spending more time in silence with God. Consider this Lent how fasting might help us to be more loving and community oriented. St Francis teaches that perfect joy is found in "conquering himself, and willingly enduring suffering, insults, humiliations and hardships for the love of Christ".

Encourage your students to study the life of a saint during this Lent. Invite them to do a presentation in the class about their saints. The Lenten chart below is an example for you to use it as it is or modify it according to your class.
